Crawford sparks Raiders past KM, fourth in row

Scott Crawford rambled 50 yards with a fumble recovery and also scored on a 69-yard run last night at South Point Stadium to spark the Red Raiders to their fourth straight victory, 24-7 over Southwest 3-A Conference rival Kings Mountain.

The area's leading pointmaker paced the Raiders to a 14-0 halftime lead and they increased it to 24-0 before the Mountaineers finally got on the scoreboard late in the fourth period.

Ironically, KM's only score also came on a fumble recovery, end Terry Putnam catching Don Davis' bobble in mid-air and racing 55 yards for a touchdown with 4:06 to play.

The victory was only the second for a Belmont team over the Mountainers in the 17-year history of the SWC. The Belmonters also won three years ago in Kings Mountain, 12-7.

Last night's victory was South Point's most impressive of the year even though the offense sputtered at times.

"I was pleased with our de-

fensive play," said Coach Jim Biggerstaff, "but I wasn't so pleased with our offense. We missed some scoring opportunities."

Biggerstaff said it would be hard to singl out any defensive stars, but he cited Crawford for his great all-round play.

South Point's defense stopped the Mountaineers cold in the second half, holding the visitors to only one first down (on a penalty) and 18 yards rushing.

The Mountaineers opened the game like they'd run the Raiders out of the park, But, with 3:30 le't in the first quarter, Mountaineer quarterback Geeper Howard fumbled on the 50, Crawford scooped up the pig-

skin and raced untouched down the right sidelines for his first touchdown, Joey Metz added the PAT from placement for a 7-0 Raider lead.

Crawford came home from 69 yards for South Point's second score with 4:47 left in the half and again Metz added the PAT for a 14-0 halftime margin.

SOUTH POINT drove 51 yards for its third score which came with 5:37 left in the third quarter.

And, odd as it may seem, the score came exactly the same way as South Rowan's lone tally in last week's 8-6 loss to the Red Raiders,

On a third down and 14 play from the KM 27, quarterback Bill Hannon's pass was apparently broken up by Howard of the Mountaineers, but when Howard batted it, the pigskin fell into the hands of Mike McWhirter of the Big Red and McWhirter scooted into the end zone for the score.

Metz was true again on the placement and it was 21 to zip.

A pass interception by Curtis Moss on the RM 40 set up South Point's final score. a 32-yard field goal by Metz with 6:42 showing on the clock.

From the 40, Davis and Ivester moved the ball to the 21 for a first down and Jeff Auten carried it to the 10. But on a third and five from the five, Hannon was tossed for a 10-yard loss.

That put the ball on the 15 and Metz, kicking from the 22, split the uprights for the three-pointer.

Kings Mountain's score came with 4:06 left in the game when Davis fumbled on a first down play and Putnam outran the field to the end zone, Chuck Carpenter added the PAT from placement.

The loss was the second straight for the Mountaineers, who host Cherryville next week. South Point, the only undefeated, untied team in the SWC, plays at Lincolnton next week.
