The Mountaineers were held to minus eight yards rushing as the Big Red, stymied somewhat on offense by the stubborn Mounties, copped their fourth straight victory without defeat by a 20-0 score.

It was the second shutout of the season for Jim Biggerstaffs charges and South Rowan managed just one touchdown last week. Meanwhile, South Point has scored 137 points with the pigskin.

Four lost fumbles last night hurt the cause, giving Kings Mountain good field position each time, but each time the defense rose up to do their thing.

The Raiders, helped along by penalty, drove 95 yards for a first quarter score. A 20-yard run by Dean Ivester helped the march along and a 27-yard pass from quarterback Bill Hannon to end Mike McWhirter carrying to the seven set up Scott Crawfords one-yard touchdown run. Dennis Grier kicked the first of his two extra points for a 7-0 Raider lead.

That's the way it stood at halftime as Chris Blantons kicking and the excellent KM punt coverage kept South Point back deep in its own territory.
