

Raiders crush Cavaliers

60-0 for ninth in row

Maybe we ought to give you the touchdowns in chronological order, but even that would take a page and a half.

It was a wild one, all right. East Rutherford's favorite passing target was South Point's man-on-the-eternal-scene, Scott Crawford.

Crawford, through his usual means, scored four touchdowns and a couple of extra points at a Cavalier disaster area (South Point Stadium) last night as the Big Red Machine laid one on to the tune of 60-0.

It's usually a close game when these two teams get together, but South Point turned Marley Sigmon's club every way but loose in registering their eighth straight victory, ninth overall, and sewing up the regular season Southwest 3-A Conference title.

Shelby clung to second place Friday with a hard-earned 21-15 victory over Chase in Shelby. The Raiders of Jim Biggerstaff can close out their first undefeated regular season since 1953 next Friday with a victory over Burns on the road.

The one-sided win was the 20th in the last 21 games for South Point and they marched over the 300-point mark with the win. South Point has now tallied 327 points in nine games while surrendering just 41.

Crawford ran his scoring total on the year to a county and area leading 154 with his 24-point burst. Crawford intercepted two of Brad Biggers' passes and ran them back for six-pointers on runs of 55 and 90 yards.

Crawford also scored on a four-yard run and took a 46-yard scoring heave from Bill Hannon, senior quarterback who

was on target most of the night. Hannon tossed for two touchdowns and a pair of extra point conversions and hit on five of eight passes for 125 yards.

Hannon's other scoring heave went to Dean Ivester on a 19-yarder and Hannon hit Crawford and Mike McWhirter on two-point conversions.

THE RAIDERS forward wall was tough on East's punter, blocking two of them for scores. McWhirter blocked one, picked it up and ran 40 yards for a score. William Clark picked up another and hauled it back 32 yards for another.

Ivester, in addition to his 19-yard pass from Hannon, also shook loose on a 64-yard scoring run. Hannon actually accounted for three scores as he scored one himself on a nice 19-yard run.

The Big Red scored in every quarter, with the second being their biggest on a 20-point out-

burst. Crawford didn't carry the ball all that much, picking up 62 yards in 13 carries and he handled the ball just once from scrimmage in the second half. But he kept the crowd alive with his long punt returns.

South Point drove 64 yards for its first score in 10 plays with Hannon passing to Ivester for 19 yards and the score at the 6:02 mark. The only weakness for the Big Red for the night seemed to be on extra points as they had several blocked.

Still in the first quarter, Crawford's pass interception from the SP 48 to the East 34 set up his own touchdown from the four at the 3:35 mark.

The brilliant Crawford must have run a mile and a half during the night with his kickoff returns, punt returns, pass interceptions, across-the-field tackles and runs from scrimmage. He was too tired to do anything but watch at the post-game dance last night. Anyhow, he does his most timely dancing on the field.
