## Richmond's FG gives Red Raiders playoff berth

GASTONIA - It doesn't get any closer than this.

In a wild, back-and-forth offensive shootout between two of the top teams in the Big South 3A, South Point ultimately prevailed on a B.J. Richmond 27yard field goal in double overtime to give the Red Raiders a 44-41 victory and keep them tied with North Gaston atop the con-

ference.
"It was an exciting game," South Point head coach John Devine said. "It was one of those that you're glad you won but you know it could have gone either

Richmond had a chance to win the game in regulation with a 28varder as time expired but Jesse Whitley's snap sailed high.

"I wasn't nervous or any-thing," Whitley said. "I just kind of messed it up.'

Tyler holder, picked up the loose ball and hurled it at Joe Brown, who nearly caught it for a touchdown.

After teams traded touchdowns in the first extra period, Forestview fumbled on its first play in the second overtime on a botched exchange from center to quarterback.

Richmond and Whitley then got their second chance to win the game with a field goal and redeemed themselves.

### Richmond comes up big for SP

Being a kicker can sometimes be the lonelist job on the gridiron you're either a hero or a goat.

B.J. Richmond turned out to be the hero of South Point's 44-41 double-overtime win over Forestview Friday night at Joe Alala Stadium.

Richmond's 27-yard field goal in the second overtime period capped an incredible game in which the changed hands 13 times. The win also insured the Red Raiders (5-3, 4-0 Big South 3A) of one of the new league's three playoff spots.

"The team really won this game tonight," Richmond said. "I only had a portion of the points. They really won the game, giving it all they had.

That might be true, but Richmond sure did his part.

The University of South Carolina baseball signee was 5-for-5 on PAT's, in addition to kicking the game winner.

Richmond almost ended the game in regulation with 2.9 seconds left on the clock. However, a bad snap and a botched hold didn't give Richmond a chance to get off a kick that might have broken a 34-34 tie.

On first down and goal to go from the 10-yard line, South Point coach John Devine didn't try to run a play or two before sending Richmond back out there for yet another gamewinning attempt. Devine went for the win immediately, and didn't think twice about it.
"No doubt," Devine said.

"He's an all-state guy, and he can kick it from anywhere."

Richmond, who says he would entertain an opportunity to kick for the Gamecock football team, has successfully kicked four field goals this season and 16 extra points. He has also scored a touchdown and converted on a two-point

"I'll take any game that's close as long as we're in the game," Forestview coach Scott Lee said. "South Point -they've got a great offense and we played a great game on offense. We knew we had the talent, we knew we had the ability to do things but we had to find where our heart was and tonight we found our heart. If we build on this, we can go places.

The ballclubs combined for 746 yards of total offense. South Point (5-3, 4-0 BS3A), which clinched a playoff berth with the win, covered 317 yards on the ground and 104 by air. Forestview (4-4, 1-2 BS3A) got 300 of its 325 yards by running the hall.

Much of the yardage came on big plays. Together, the teams recorded seven plays of 30 or more yards.

Forestview's Mario Dye rushed 16 times for 130 yards and four touchdowns while quarterback Demario Crosby carried 13 times for 116 yards.

South Point's Rasharde Reid, hobbling with a sore ankle, amassed 93 yards and touchdowns on two touches. Alvin Williams reached the end zone three times, covering 144 total rushing and receiving yards and returning a Forestview punt 70 yards for a touch-

"We've got some weapons," Devine said. "If we get everybody healthy, we can score some points and so can Forestyiew."

And while both offenses

SHELBY - It didn't take Shelby long to take control in its 27-7 Midwest 2A football win over West Lincoln Friday

The Rebels (4-4, 0-4 MW2A) took over at their own 31 after the opening kickoff and Cory Carpenter picked up 1 yard on first-and-10. That's when the Shelby defense turned the screws on the Rebels.

On second-and-nine snap sailed over West Lincoln quarterback Justin Pearson's head and he was downed 18 yards

What the Shelby defense displayed on that drive was a microcosm of what West Lincoln experienced throughout the night. The Lions held the Rebels to minus 17 yards at the end of the first quarter, six yards at the half and only 24 through three quarters. Only in the fourth quarter - when Shelby coach Chris Norman mercifully removed his defensive starters - did West Lincoln finally move the football.

The result of the stingy Shelby defense was the 20-point win. Tavarus Hill and O'Bryan Wilson provided two touch-downs each for the Golden Li-

ons in the rout.
