Littlejohn combined for 128/ yards and two touchdowns/ Plus, Lee helped himself as a runner, picking up a net of 13 yards and a one-yard quarterback sneak in the third quarter. "They're tough and they're good," said South Point coach John Devine, whose team fell to 3-1 after scoring 50 or more points in its first three games.

Even in a losing effort, the Red Raiders did something no one else had done in Crest's two previous games: They scored.

South Point, which reached the Crest 15 late in the first half, ended the Chargers' defensive excellence with an impressive drive to open the second half.

Led by fullback Joe Brown, the Red Raiders went 71 yards in seven plays, capped by Brown's 12-yard scoring run with 8:25 left in the third quarter. It was Brown's 14th The this season. He finished with 121 yards rushing.

South Point got one shot at a tying drive, but an apparent fake punt on fourth-and-one from the Red Raiders' own 24 on their next possession was aborted by an illegal procedure penalty.

After the subsequent punt, Crest pushed the lead to 21-7 on Lee's quarterback sneak with 1:12 left in the third quar-

ter.

The Chargers put the game away on its next possession following Travis Strong's 51-yard pass interception return to the South Point 27.

After Lee's 21-yard pass to Jermaine Strong, Martray Littlejohn scored on a six-yard run and Daniel Padgett's fourth PAT ended the scoring.

"We made some good reads at the first of the second half," Devine said. "But then they came right back on us. As soon as we would do something, they would come right back at us."

However, South Point kept fighting as well.

The Red Raiders had a field goal blocked as time expired and finished with 287 yards total offense and 15 first downs to 387 yards and 15 first downs for Crest.

"They're the best team we've played so far," said Kirby, whose team was hampered by 135 yards in penalties. "There's no doubt about it. John does a terrific job and they play hard and they don't quit."
