Raiders clinch title

Raiders cap off perhaps most impressive conference title run ever

DENVER - South Point High football players, coaches and supporters all held four fingers in the air as they celebrated in East Lincoln's David Clark Stadium after a 28-7 victory Friday over the homestanding Mustangs

The Red Raiders were signifying their fourth straight conference championship in

school history

It was perhaps the school's most impressive of the nine league titles South Point has won in its 34-year history.

Not only did the Raiders roll to an unbeaten, untied conference mark for the seventh time in school history, but South Point trailed only briefly in two league games and rolled up an im-pressive 195-39 point differential in six Big South 3A Conference games this season.

conference championship and homefield advantage was what this game was about," said Red Raiders junquarterback Javar Williams, whose team-doesn't find out its playoff future until pairings are released at approximately 6 tonight by the NCHSAA. "We feel that if we play our game, nobody can beat us.

East Lincoln would certainly agree after South Point rolled in finishing its regular season at 9-1.

The Mustangs (7-4, made three costly mistakes in the opening half.

Not only did the Red Raiders take advantage, but

they took control of the game in doing so.

On the opening series, East Lincoln appeared to have South Point's powerful offense stopped near midfield after allowing one first down

But a holding penalty at the line of scrimmage on a fourthand-nine punt gave the Red Raiders a first down at the Mustangs 38.

Seven plays later, Williams kept the ball on the option right from 1 yard out for the game's first touchdown.

The next South Point series, East Lincoln again forced a punt after one first down.

But this time, the Mustangs fumbled the return to give the Red Raiders possession at the East Lincoln 21.

And while the Mustangs defense forced South Point to give up the ball on downs and after a touchdown pass was nullified by a motion penalty the extra plays meant the Red Raiders controlled possession for 25 of the game's first 33 plays.

East Lincoln was back on defense again after another turnover - a diving interception by Jonathan Mitchell af-ter the Mustangs had reached the Red Raiders 43.

South, Point halfback Joe Brown then carried five times for 67 yards in a nine-play, 81yard drive, including a 5-yard TD run. Andrew Rinehart's second of four extra points made it 14-0 at the half.

The Red Raiders tacked on two more scores in the second half - one each by Williams and Brown - to go ahead 28-0

with 8:27 to play.

East Lincoln got on the scoreboard - and snapped South Point's scoreless streak on Dennis at 11 quarters -Hickman's 23-yard scoring pass to Grant Covington with 2:15 to play.

William's directed a 325yard offensive attack, picking up 113 yards rushing and 31 passing. Brown finished with 153 yards on 24 carries
