Raiders bounce back

KINGS MOUNTAIN - The beginning of Friday night's South Point-Kings Mountain game was delayed about 10 minutes because the emergency personnel required to be at every high school game had not yet arrived.

Unfortunately for Mountaineers, that just delayed a buzz aw, as South Point dominated every facet of the game, blowing out Kings Mountain 49-0 at John

Gamble Stadium.

Reigning Gazette offensive player of the year Javar Williams accounted for four touchdowns - three throwing and one more on the ground as the Red Raiders piled up 522 yards of total offense, and held Kings Mountain to only 63 yards.

"We respect Kings Mountain too much to sulk after last week's game. We came ready to play," South Point head coach John Devine said of his Red Raiders, who lost 28-21 last week to South Carolina power Northwestern.

It didn't take South Point (1-1) long, as the Red Raiders scored on the opening drive of the game when Williams found a streaking Ivey Watson down the left sideline for a 44-yard

score, and a 7-0 lead.

The Red Raiders appeared to extend the lead to 14-0 when Williams hit Tyler Gorton for a score, but a holding penalty negated the play, one of 10 South Point penalties for 84 yards. The penalties were the one part of the game that Devine could criticize.

"The penalties killed us," Devine said. "We have to eliminate stopping ourselves if we're going to be successful."

The penalties didn't slow the Red Raiders. Early in the sec-
