## South Point manhandles Franklin in playoff rout

BELMONT— Franklin coach Fred Goldsmith said earlier in the week he was impressed with South Point's team from watching it on tape.

Up close and in person, he was even more impressed.


"They're really, really good," Goldsmith said after South Point rolled past his Panthers 42-0 Friday night in the second round of the 3A playoffs at Lineberger Stadium.

"Essentially, they played with the same team as last year. And they're much improved, a little bigger, a little stronger and a little faster. And they're so wellcoached."

Even Red Raiders coach John Devine, who chided his team a bit for lackluster play after a 54-

14 first-round victory over East Henderson, was pleased with his team.

"I'll tell you what, that was a good football team we just beat," said Devine, whose team beat Franklin 37-27 last season. "So you know we had to play extremely well to beat them.

"Offensively, that's the best we've done. And defensively, we got a shutout against a veteran running back and a veter-

an quarterback."

Make no mistake about it. South Point was its efficient best on a night in which the Red Raiders improved to 12-1 overall by scoring on six of their 11 offensive possessions.

South Point advanced to host another playoff game Friday, this time against South Piedmont Conference co-champion Concord. Concord rolled to a 55-6 victory Friday over the Red Raiders' Big South Conference rival, Hunter Huss.

Javar Williams again led the way, this time with dead-eve throwing accuracy more than

his fleet feet.

Williams had his second-best passing game of the season, completing six of 10 throws for 171 yards and two touchdowns while also eclipsing 1,000 yards passing for only the third time in South Point's 34vear history.

Williams now has 1,153 yards passing this season - only eight yards behind Doug Davis' school-record 1,161 yards in 1973. And he improved his career total to 2.553 - or nearly 500 shy of Davis

school record from 1972-74.

Williams' touchdown strikes opened the game's scoring and went for 27 yards to Ivey Watson and 59 vards to Tyler Gorton as South Point went ahead 14-0 after one quarter.

"I didn't underestimate their quarterback's ability to throw," Goldsmith said. "But I probably underestimated their willingness to throw it. I dared them some to throw and they did."

After loosening up the Panthers' defense with the early throws. Williams then orchestrated a rushing attack that started slow before finishing with 387 yards.

Joe Brown continued his assault on the county record book with 160 more yards rushing

and four more touchdowns. Brown's career total of 3,439 yards rushing is now sixth alltime in the county and his point total of 376 is a scant two points behind all-time corecord-holders Junior Hall of Gaston Day and Ashbrook and Mario Dve of Forestview.

Yet, as impressive as the Williams, Brown and the Red Raiders' offense was, the defense was equally impressive.

It not only limited a powerful Panthers offense to 157 yards total, but it also recorded the third playoff shutout in school history. South Point previously shut out Newton-Conover 41-0 in 1971 and Enka 41-0 in 1993.

Franklin entered the game averaging 24.4 points per game and having scored 10 or more in each contest.

That unit had been led by runner Chris Durm and quarterback Cecil Pollack, Durm had 1.503 vards rushing and Pollack 805 yards passing and 1.204 vards total offense.

Friday, that duo was stopped cold with the exception of one 26-vard Durm burst and a 23yard Pollack scramble. Overall, Durm finished with 59 vards rushing in 17 carries and Pollack had 47 yards passing and 37 yards rushing.

Brandon Reid's 10 first-hit or solo tackles and a fumble recovery led the Red Raiders' defense, which also got six stops from Randy Robinson, including three for losses.
