## North Gaston buries South Point playoff hopes under pile of mud

BELMONT - On a night the rest of the county postponed its games due to forecasted heavy rain, North Gaston players took offense to South Point's decision to play their game as scheduled.

"We thought they were challenging us, saying that we couldn't play them in the rain," linebacker Chris Robinson said. "So we were eager to come play."

It was North Gaston that took advan-

South Point (3-7, 2-3) Big South 3A/4A Conference) struggled mightily in the rain - they fumbled 11 times and lost five of them. Meanwhile, North Gaston (8-3, 3-3) fumbled just once.


The theme of the night became apparent early.

If the Red Raiders thought the rain and mud would slow down North Gaston's potent offense, they were wrong. Although the Wildcats were forced to punt on their first possession, they scored touchdowns on their next four series for a commanding 42-0 lead with 5:47 remaining in the second quarter.

The rain also didn't keep North Gaston from airing it out. A.J. Blue threw a deep pass, though incomplete, on the first offensive play as the Wildcats demonstrated they weren't going to deviate from their usual gameplan.

Blue finished with only 94 yards on 4-of-12 passing but the Wildcats hardly needed to throw with the way the running room opened up. Blue ran for 137 yards on 14 carries, including touchdown runs of 1 and 60 vards. Princeton Brooks piled up 127 yards on 21 carries and scored on runs of 28 and 19 yards.

As a team, North Gaston rushed for 278 vards, a shade over its average for the season.

Red Raiders were. plagued with bad handoffs and bad pitches all night, and his power but didn't return.

North Gaston applied pressure in the backfield seemingly every play.

South Point didn't get on the board until the first play of the fourth quarter when Lowery hit Chris Lane on a 33yard scoring completion. The Red Raiders had another chance to score on their last possession but Lowery fumbled at the 1-yard line and Kennedy recovered on a play that summed up the night.

"It was wet all night on both sides," Devine said. "It affected their passing game, I feel certain. But it didn't affect their ball handling. It shouldn't have affected ours. You've just got to execute. You can't control the conditions.

As for South Point's decision not to postpone the game, Devine offered no apologies.

"The field wasn't a factor." he said. "It turned out to be a pretty decent night. It rained. It was 56 degrees. I mean, you know, it rained. Football is a game you play in the rain.'

Dakiem Johnson and Robinson recovered the other fumbles for North Gaston, which snapped a two-game losing streak.

Aside from the fumbles, South South Point, meanwhile, Point's offense took another hit managed only 141 yards on early when fullback and leading the ground and 97 passing. rusher suffered a concussion at the 8:18 mark of the first quarter. He walked to the sideline on

South Point's hopes of continuing a streak of seven straight playoff appearances also took a serious hit. The Red Raiders need four wins to become playoff eligible and close out the regular season at powerhouse Crest next week.

North Gaston, on the other hand, boosted its chances of hosting a first-round home game on a night it also tied a school record for wins. Nothing is certain, however, until the pairings are released Nov. 4. With a bye next week, the Wildcats will have an extra week to prepare for the first-round matchup.
