## Raiders survive aerial assault

Lowery continues to run Red Bone to near perfection

BELMONT — South Point gave up over 300 yards in the air, but had enough ground power to make up for it in a Friday night football war in Belmont.

The Red Raiders countered a brilliant passing performance by Alexander Central quarterback Josh Russell with 466 rushing yards to defeat the Cougars 48-21 in a non-conference football tilt at Lineberger Stadium.

Russell completed 26 of 40 passes for 317 yards and three touchdowns. But it was much ado about nothing in the end as South Point used a big-play offense and a stingy rushing defense to run its record to 3-0.

"That Russell kid is a great player," said South Point coach John Devine. "I wish we'd had a long drive or two to keep him off the field. But we kept putting points on the board and that was enough."

Devine said he knew the Cougars would be ready from the opening whistle.

"(Alexander Central coach) Tommy Harper's teams always play hard," Devine said. "They're always well-prepared."

But the Red Raiders were prepared as well. Quarterback Desmond Lowery read the Alexander defense like a book, executing the Red

Bone offense to perfection.

"We did a good job reading the defense," Devine said.
"Desmond took some licks, but that's part of the game."

Lowery was brilliant on the ground and in the air, rushing 15 times for 220 yards and completing five of six passes for 90 yards. He scored on touchdown runs of 94 and 68 yards and made several brilliant pitches to wingback Chris Lane, helping the 6-foot, 175-pound senior running back to a 106-yard performance for the night.

"We're 3-0 with a long way to go," Devine said. "The objective is to win them all, but we've got a lot to work on "

we've got a lot to work on."

The Red Raiders came out strong, scoring twice in the first quarter on a one-yard run by Aaron Crumbley and a 94-yard run by Lowery, who ducked in behind a brilliant block by right guard Will Gulledge and sprinted across the field to put South Point up 14-0. Alexander Central roared back in the second quarter as Russell found wide receiver Ralph Adams

on a 15-yard scoring strike.
South Point kicker James
Justice pushed the lead to
17-7 with a 33-yard field
goal with 1:19 left in the
half, but the Cougars responded quickly as Russell
connected with Byron
Mayes on an 11-yard touchdown pass to cut the lead to
17-14. Alexander Central
looked to be headed to a
halftime lead on the last
play of the half as defensive
lineman A.J. Hopke hit Lowery from behind as he was
trying to pass, scooped up
the fumble and dashed toward the end zone. But Lowery caught him from behind
at the two-yard line to preserve the halftime lead.

The second half was all South Point as the Red Raiders scored on their first two possesions and made the necessary defensive tweaks to contain Russell.

"In the first half, we didn't do a good job containing," Devine said. "We had to put him in the pocket more and get some pressure on him. I thought we made the right adjustments. They got a lot of yards but they didn't get a lot of points.
