Black 'N Blue Bone Night

SP lights up ex-coach Devine, Clover

BELMONT — They beat their former head coach. They beat a South Carolina team for the first time. And, by the looks of things, it won't be the last time they crush an opponent this season.

South Point dominated every phase of the game in a 63-0 whipping of Coveron Friday, ruining John Devine's debut as Blue Eagles head coach in the stadiumhehad called home since 1990.

"We played football about as well as we could play tonight," said Mickey Lineberger, promoted from offensive coordinator to head coach after Devine's departure in March.

And that goes for offense, defense and special teams.

Troy Leeper rushed for 140 yards and three TDs and Tyler Bray piled up 169 and two scores on the ground as South Point's "Red Bone" triple-option offense appeared to be in midseason form. South Point rolled up 451 yards of offense (415 on the ground) while holding Clover to a measily 42.

South Point scored on six of its seven first-half possessions and rolled up 325 yards of offense compared to Clover's 39 for a 42-0 halfitime advantage. Two possessions after the break, second teamers were already beginning to see action.

The Red Raiders (1-0) exerted their dominance from the beginning. They caught Clover by surprise on the opening kickoff and recovered an onside kick. In fact, South Point recovered two onside kicks, forced a turnover on a pooch kick and recovered yet another fumble on a punt. Clover also fumbled twice on offense for a total of six lost possessions.

"It's my fault," said Devine, who led South Point to two state titles in his 15 years as head coach. "I didn't have them ready to play."

Josh Allman recovered two of the fumbles while Jeremy Sanders and Jordan Kagen recovered one each.

"We were determined," said Allman, one of 27 seniors on the roster. "We just had a good mindset."

The players wouldn't budge much when asked about playing against their former coach, who led the Red Raiders to 10 conference championships.

"It was just the first game of the year and we were more focused on actually winning," left tackle Jeffrey Lawing said. "It didn't have anything to do with Coach Devine."

Nothing? "Nah, eh, a little bit."

Quarterback Patrick:Horne carried 13 times for 80 yards and two TDs and completed both of his passes for 36 yards and another score.

South Point broke through in the series for the first time in four tries. The teams have met in the season opener since 2008. The game also ended Clover's 15-game winning streak against Gaston County opponents. The Blue Eagles' hadn't lost against Gaston County since 2004, when Ashbrook and Forestview pulled off victories in back-to-back weeks.
